

13 (1) in subsection (a)—



1 (A) by striking “or consortia of such insti-
2 tutions or libraries” and inserting “museums,
3 or consortia of such entities”;

4 (B) by striking “new”;

5 (C) by inserting “from foreign sources”
6 after “disseminate information”;

7 (2) in subsection (b)—

8 (A) by inserting “acquire and” before “fa-
9 cilitate access” in paragraph (1);

10 (B) by striking “new means of” in para-
11 graph (3) and inserting “new means and stand-
12 ards for”;

13 (C) by striking “and” at the end of para-
14 graph (6);

15 (D) by striking the period at the end of

20 cluding those that are eligible to receive assistance
21 under part A or B of title III or under title V)”
22 after “other institutions of higher education”;

23 (2) in subsection (e), by adding at the end the
24 following new paragraph:



1 “(5) SPECIAL RULE.—The Secretary may waive
2 or reduce the required non-Federal share for institu-
3 tions that—

4 “(A) are eligible to receive assistance
5 under part A or B of title III or under title V;
6 and

7 “(B) have submitted a grant application
8 under this section that demonstrates a need for
9 a waiver or reduction.”.

10 (b) EDUCATION AND TRAINING PROGRAMS.—Section
11 613 (20 U.S.C. 1130a) is amended by adding at the end
12 the following new subsection:

13 “(e) SPECIAL RULE.—The Secretary may waive or
14 reduce the required non-Federal share for institutions
15 that—

16 “(1) are eligible to receive assistance under part
17 A or B of title III or under title V; and

18 “(2) have submitted a grant application under
19 this section that demonstrates a need for a waiver
20 or reduction.”.

21 (c) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—Section

9 grant under this section shall contribute to the conduct
10 of the program supported by the grant an amount from
11 non-Federal sources equal to at least one-half of the

13 or in kind. The Secretary may waive or reduce the re-
14 quired non-Federal share for institutions that—

15 “(1) are eligible to receive assistance under part

20 (b) INSTITUTIONAL DEVELOPMENT.—Section 622

24 ceive funds under this title”.

2 U.S.C. 1131b(a)) is amended by inserting after “1978,”
3 the following: “Alaska Native-serving, Native Hawaiian-
4 serving, and Hispanic-serving institutions, ”.

5 (d) ADVANCED DEGREE IN INTERNATIONAL RELA-
6 TIONS.—Section 624 (20 U.S.C. 1131b) is amended—

7 (1) by striking “MASTERS” in the heading of
8 such section and inserting “ADVANCED”;

9 (2) by striking “a masters degree in inter-
10 national relations” and inserting “an advanced de-
11 gree in international relations, international affairs,
12 international economics, or other academic areas re-
13 lated to the Institute fellow’s career objectives”; and

14 (3) by striking “The masters degree program”
15 and inserting “The advanced degree study program
16 shall be designed by the consortia, consistent with
17 the fellow’s career objectives, and”.

18 (e) INTERNSHIPS.—Section 625 (20 U.S.C. 1131c)
19 is amended—

20 (1) in subsection (a), by inserting after “1978,”
21 the following: “Alaska Native-serving, Native Hawai-
22 ian-serving, and Hispanic-serving institutions, ”;

23 (2) in subsection (b)—

24 (A) by inserting “and” after the semicolon
25 at the end of paragraph (2);



1 (B) by striking “; and” at the end of para-
2 graph (3) and inserting a period; and

3 (C) by striking paragraph (4); and
4 (3) by striking subsection (c).

5 (f) REPORT.—Section 626 (20 U.S.C. 1131d) is
6 amended by striking “annually prepare a report” and in-
7 serting “prepare a report biennially”.

8 (g) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—Section
9 628 (20 U.S.C. 1131f) is amended—

10 (1) by striking “1999” and inserting “2004”;
11 and

12 (2) by striking “4 succeeding” and inserting “5
13 succeeding”.

14 **SEC. 5. EVALUATION, OUTREACH, AND DISSEMINATION.**

15 Part D of title VI is amended by inserting after sec-
16 tion 631 (20 U.S.C. 1132) the following new section:

17 **“SEC. 632. EVALUATION, OUTREACH, AND DISSEMINATION.**

18 “The Secretary may use not more than 1 percent of
19 the funds made available for this title for program evalua-
20 tion, national outreach, and information dissemination ac-
21 tivities.”.

22 **SEC. 6. ADVISORY BOARD.**

23 Part D of title VI is amended by inserting after sec-
24 tion 632 (as added by section 5) the following new section:



1 **“SEC. 633. INTERNATIONAL HIGHER EDUCATION ADVISORY**
2 **BOARD.**

3 “(a) ESTABLISHMENT AND PURPOSE.—

4 “(1) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established in
5 the Department an independent International High-
6 er Education Advisory Board (hereafter in this sec-
7 tion referred to as the ‘International Advisory
8 Board’). The International Advisory Board shall
9 provide advice, counsel and recommendations to the
10 Congress and to the Secretary on international edu-
11 cation issues for higher education.

12 “(2) PURPOSE.—The purpose of the Inter-
13 national Advisory Board is—

14 “(A) to provide expertise in the area of na-
15 tional needs for proficiency in world regions,
16 foreign languages, and international affairs;

17 “(B) to make recommendations that will
18 result in the growth and development of inter-
19 national education programs at the postsec-
20 ondary level that encourage diverse perspectives
21 and reflect the full range of views on world re-
22 gions, foreign languages, and international af-
23 fairs;

24 “(C) to advise the Secretary with respect
25 to the opportunities for careers in international



1 affairs in order to meet the goals of an en-
2 hanced national security objective; and

3 “(D) to provide extensive knowledge and
4 understanding of the Federal, State, and pri-
5 vate sector programs related to international
6 education at the postsecondary education level.

7 “(b) INDEPENDENCE OF INTERNATIONAL ADVISORY
8 BOARD.—In the exercise of its functions, powers, and du-
9 ties, the International Advisory Board shall be inde-
10 pendent of the Secretary and the other offices and officers
11 of the Department. The recommendations of the Inter-
12 national Advisory Board shall not be subject to review or
13 approval by any officer in the executive branch, but shall
14 be submitted to the Secretary for comment prior to sub-
15 mission to the Congress in accordance with subsection (f).

16 “(c) MEMBERSHIP.—

17 “(1) REPRESENTATION.—The International
18 Advisory Board shall have 7 members, who shall be
19 appointed by the Secretary, in consultation with the
20 Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security,
21 and shall include (but not be limited to) representa-
22 tives of States, institutions of higher education, cul-
23 tural organizations, educational organizations, local
24 educational agencies, students, and private citizens
25 with expertise in international concerns.




1 “(2) QUALIFICATION.—Members of the Inter-
2 national Advisory Board shall be individuals who
3 have been appointed on the basis of technical quali-
4 fications, professional standing, experience working
5 in international affairs or foreign service occupa-
6 tions, and demonstrated knowledge in the fields of
7 higher education and international education, includ-
8 ing foreign languages, world regions, or international
9 affairs.

10 “(d) FUNCTIONS OF THE COMMITTEE.—The Inter-
11 national Advisory Board shall—

12 “(1) annually review and comment upon the se-
13 lection criteria and regulations for grants under this
14 title;

15 “(2) annually monitor, apprise, and evaluate
16 the activities of grant recipients based on the pur-
17 poses and objectives of this title and in the author-
18 ized activities of each part, which may include an
19 evaluation of the performance of grantees;

20 “(3) annually make recommendations that will
21 assist the Congress and the Secretary to improve the
22 programs under this title to better reflect the na-
23 tional needs related to the homeland security, inter-
24 national education, and international affairs, includ-
25 ing an assessment of the national needs and the



1 training provided by the institutions of higher edu-
2 cation that receive a grant under this title for expert
3 and non-expert level foreign language training;

4 “(4) annually provide for public hearing and
5 comment regarding the matter contained in the rec-
6 ommendations described in paragraph (3), prior to
7 the submission of those recommendations to Con-
8 gress and the Secretary;

9 “(5) recommend to the Congress and the Sec-
10 retary such studies, surveys, and analyses of inter-
11 national education that provide feedback about the
12 programs under this title and assure that their rel-
13 ative authorized activities reflect diverse perspectives
14 and the full range of views on world regions, foreign
15 languages, and international affairs;

16 “(6) make recommendations that will strength-
17 en the partnerships between local educational agen-
18 cies, public and private elementary and secondary
19 education schools, and grant recipients under this
20 title to ensure that the research and knowledge
21 about world regions, foreign languages, and inter-
22 national affairs is widely disseminated to local edu-
23 cational agencies;

24 “(7) make recommendations on how institutions
25 of higher education that receive a grant under this



1 title can encourage students to serve the nation and
2 meet national needs in an international affairs,
3 international business, foreign language, or national
4 security capacity;

5 “(8) assess how linkages between institutions of
6 higher education and public and private organiza-
7 tions that are involved in international education,
8 language training, and international research capac-
9 ities create and enhance manpower and information
10 needs of United States businesses; and

11 “(9) annually advise the Secretary and the Con-
12 gress about opportunities for underrepresented pop-
13 ulations in the areas of international relations, inter-
14 national affairs, and international economics, in
15 order to effectively carry out the activities of the In-
16 stitute in part C.

17 “(e) OPERATIONS OF THE COMMITTEE.—

18 “(1) TERMS.—Each member of the Inter-
19 national Advisory Board shall be appointed for a
20 term of 3 years. A member of the International Ad-
21 visory Board may be reappointed to successive terms
22 on the International Advisory Board.

23 “(2) VACANCIES.—Any member appointed to
24 fill a vacancy occurring prior to the expiration of the
25 term of a predecessor shall be appointed only for the



1 remainder of such term. A member of the Inter-
2 national Advisory Board shall, upon request, con-
3 tinue to serve after the expiration of a term until a
4 successor has been appointed.

5 “(f) SUBMISSION TO DEPARTMENT FOR COM-
6 MENT.—The International Advisory Board shall submit
7 its proposed recommendations to the Department of Edu-
8 cation for comment for a period not to exceed 30 days
9 in each instance.

10 “(g) PERSONNEL AND RESOURCES.—

11 “(1) COMPENSATION AND EXPENSE.—Members
12 of the International Advisory Board may each re-
13 ceive reimbursement for travel expenses incident to
14 attending International Advisory Board meetings,
15 including per diem in lieu of subsistence, as author-
16 ized by section 5703 of title 5, United States Code,
17 for persons in the Government service employed
18 intermittently.

19 “(2) PERSONNEL.— The International Advisory
20 Board may appoint such personnel as may be deter-
21 mined necessary by the Chairman without regard to
22 the provisions of title 5, United States Code, gov-
23 erning appointments in the competitive service, and
24 may be paid without regard to the provisions of
25 chapter 51 and subchapter III of chapter 53 of such



1 title relating to classification and General Schedule
2 pay rates, but no individual so appointed shall be
3 paid in excess of the rate authorized for GS-18 of
4 the General Schedule. The International Advisory
5 Board may appoint not more than 1 full-time equiv-
6 alent, nonpermanent, consultant without regard to
7 the provisions of title 5, United States Code. The
8 International Advisory Board shall not be required
9 by the Secretary to reduce personnel to meet agency
10 personnel reduction goals.

11 “(3) CONSULTATION.—In carrying out its du-
12 ties under the Act, the International Advisory Board
13 shall consult with other Federal agencies, represent-
14 atives of State and local governments, and private
15 organizations to the extent feasible.

16 “(4) ASSISTANCE FROM OTHER AGENCIES.—

17 “(A) INFORMATION.—The International
18 Advisory Board is authorized to secure directly
19 from any executive department, bureau, agency,
20 board, commission, office, independent estab-
21 lishment, or instrumentality information, sug-
22 gestions, estimates, and statistics for the pur-
23 pose of this section and each such department,
24 bureau, agency, board, commission, office, inde-
25 pendent establishment, or instrumentality is au-



1 thorized and directed, to the extent permitted
2 by law, to furnish such information, sugges-
3 tions, estimates, and statistics directly to the
4 International Advisory Board, upon request
5 made by the Chairman.

6 “(B) SERVICES AND PERSONNEL.—The
7 head of each Federal agency shall, to the extent
8 not prohibited by law, cooperate with the Inter-
9 national Advisory Board in carrying out this
10 section. The International Advisory Board is
11 authorized to utilize, with their consent, the
12 services, personnel, information, and facilities of
13 other Federal, State, local, and private agencies
14 with or without reimbursement.

15 “(5) CONTRACTS; EXPERTS AND CONSULT-
16 ANTS.— The International Advisory Board may
17 enter into contracts for the acquisition of informa-
18 tion, suggestions, estimates, and statistics for the
19 purpose of this section. The International Advisory
20 Board is authorized to obtain the services of experts
21 and consultants without regard to section 3109 of
22 title 5, United States Code and to set pay in accord-
23 ance with such section.

24 “(h) TERMINATION.—Notwithstanding the sunset
25 and charter provisions of the Federal Advisory Committee



1 Act (5 U.S.C. App. I) or any other statute or regulation,
2 the International Advisory Committee shall be authorized
3 through September 30, 2009.

4 “(i) FUNDS.—The Secretary may use not more than
5 one-half of the funds available to the Secretary under sec-
6 tion 632 to carry out this section.”.

7 **SEC. 7. RECRUITER ACCESS TO STUDENTS AND STUDENT**
8 **RECRUITING INFORMATION; SAFETY.**

9 Part D of title VI is amended by inserting after sec-
10 tion 633 (as added by section 6) the following new sec-
11 tions:

12 **“SEC. 634. RECRUITER ACCESS TO STUDENTS AND STU-**
13 **DENT RECRUITING INFORMATION.**

14 “Each institution of higher education that receives a
15 grant under this title shall assure that—

16 “(1) any agency of the United States Govern-
17 ment is given reasonable access to the campus of the
18 institution of higher education for the purposes of
19 recruiting prospective employees;

20 “(2) no undue restrictions are placed upon stu-
21 dents that seek employment with the United States
22 Government or any agency thereof; and

23 “(3) recruiters of the United States Govern-
24 ment and agencies thereof are given the same access
25 to students as is provided generally to other institu-



1 tions of higher education and prospective employers
2 of those students for the purpose of recruiting for
3 graduate opportunities or prospective employment.

4 **“SEC. 635. STUDENT SAFETY.**

5 “Applicants seeking funds under this title to support
6 student travel and study abroad shall submit as part of
7 their grant application a description of safety policies and
8 procedures for students participating in the program while
9 abroad.”.
